(54) **SPINNING COTTON**

To the Honorable Thos Jefferson, Henry Knox, Edmund Randolph, Esqrs.

The Representative & Senator of New Jersey of Philadelphia especially sheweth.

That your petitioner above ^{mention'd} months ago purchased a model of a machine for Rolling & Spinning of Cotton at the expense of seven hundred pounds which was sold to him as a model of his friend Mr. Wright's machine and was brought into this country at the expense of vessel & cargo. Many amanments on the Captain besides imprisonment & trial as soon as your petitioner obtained it, he perceived to be made in machine for a small steady in just proportion in every respect to the said model but found it would not answer the purpose in consequence of this he wrote to the person he had purchased the model from on the 6th of Decr last and informed him that your petitioner had made a machine after the model but that it would not spin, and that as was evident some mistake had been made either by the workman or in the design but the gentleman having returned your petitioner ~~model~~ for the model without any reference to the consideration for which it was given was not thought proper to give your petitioner with an answer but as he is informed it has assigned the model over to a third Person. Your petitioner having been bid in first a manufacturer & being some judge of spinning & of yarn made such alterations in the machine from time to time as were convenient with his own judgment & hath now brought a machine to perfection for the drawing and spinning of Cotton; that the model so purchased was equal as he arrived it and that of your Petition is also equal both are ready for inspection, the difference in them is visible and material. Your petitioner's machine may be made to contain twenty spindles or twenty turners if the stream of water or other force which is to work them will carry that number and the said house will contain them.

In order to come you into idea of the importance of these machines your petitioner begs to enclose for your board to a copy of a statement in Cary's museum published in Philadelphia for Oct 1783, and which from his knowledge of Manchester Cotton goods he conceives to be a reasonable statement it is as follows.

In account of the Cotton Mills in Great Britain from Estimates of the Cotton Manufactory of that Country.

One hundred and forty three cotton mills are now built & in progress in Great Britain of which & nearly two thirds have been erected within these five years. Besides these there are above 20,000 hand mills or frames for spinning the skeins for the twisted yarns spun by the water mills.

From whence it appears that the value of wool applied to the hand and water machines in Great Britain in 1857 being $\frac{1}{3}$ 22, 600,000 (worth in the year state about £9,930,000) was worth when manufactured £ $\frac{1}{3}$ 500,000 yielding the immense profit to income-bonuses the like $\frac{1}{3}$ 5000 of £5,270,000.

It may be observed in the foregoing statement that the Raw Cotton & Wool is valued at about \$100. per lb. cotton can be purchased here from 18^d to 25^c per lb. Care & anxiety the Southern States where young negroes & women are disabled. Here & there are a few who are unable to their owners, they may in these cotton mills be employed to advantage, and the same observation, may be extended to the poor white inhabitants in our large towns, and your Petitioners conceive to a certain extent manufacturers which can have the aid of such machinery may be compelled in this country as low as in England. One girl or boy from eight to fourteen years of age will tend from 8 to 10 spindles. It is necessary to have a man or woman to every ten children, to keep order no real care & strength is required in the spinning apartment; It may be justly observed on the gen-

manufactured is only a little more than £17 1/2 pr. lb weight and calicoes are worth from 6/ to 10/3d pr. lb when finished & corded & Roy, Willets, Peover, Evans, &c. are worth from 8/ to 15/3d making from £16 15/3d pr. lb so that if the statement had been made on cotton Goods alone your Petitioner concedes that the saving to the Country would have been much more considerable Your Petitioner therefore, prays that in consideration of the expense & trouble incurred in procuring the model of the English Machine, which nevertheless proved in a great degree useless, but more especially, for the material & effectual improvement & alterations made by him, so as to perfect a machine which promises such extensive advantages to these United States & which he is now ready to lay a model before your court together with the model of the English machine in order that the improvements and alterations may be fully seen & understood, that your honorable board will be pleased to grant him his usual and accustomed sole and exclusive right and liberty of making constructing & using & of rendering to others to be used the said machine for fourteen years & in order to convince the board that your petitioner wishes to encourage the using of machines of such consequence to the Country & that it will not cost a high price for spinning he will submit to the consideration of the Board the price for spinning he shall demand after observing that the price for spinning of the machine with Sir Richard Arkwright obtained a Patent for was five guineas & although his Patent is now expired your petitioner is well informed they are still sold for one guinea pr. spindle & a Patent has lately been granted in England to Mr. Hendercock & Porthouse for a machine for spinning fine & long combed wool, these Gentlemen sell their spindles at 24/3d pr. spindle and that the cost work is higher here than in England.
